

Editorial Review

Seventh in the series Historical Dictionaries of U.S. Diplomacy, this volume details U.S. foreign relations with 11 Southeast Asian nations—Brunei, Burma (Myanmar), Cambodia, East Timor, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam. Period coverage is primarily from the nineteenth century to the present. The heart of this source is the collection of 480 or so entries, of which about one-third covers people. Author Weatherbee (University of South Carolina) includes academics, activists, clergy, foreign-service workers, heads of state, military officers, terrorists, and others. Additional entries cover events, key documents, and organizations and agencies as well as general topics such as Boat people, Environmental issues, Human rights, Religious freedom, and Vietnam syndrome. Entries in general range from 75 to 250 words, with some exceptions. The longest entries are devoted to countries. For example, the article on Thailand is 7 pages. Although country entries do provide some background information (e.g., economy, geography, early history), emphasis is placed on topics related to U.S. foreign relations. For example, the article on East Timor (2.5 pages), described as "about the size of Vermont" and the "poorest state in Southeast Asia" with a history of colonial rule, informs readers about USAID programs, a status of forces agreement, and U.S. representation in East Timor independence celebrations. Weatherbee includes a modern map of East Asia; a chronology; a 25-page introductory historical survey; a list of U.S. presidents, secretaries of state, and assistant secretaries of state for East Asian and Pacific Affairs (1950–2007); and a 27-page unannotated bibliography. The Dictionary of American Foreign Affairs (1993), with about 1,400 entries, covers some of the same topics but is older, doesn't include country entries, and lacks the Southeast Asian focus of Weatherbee's dictionary.
